

RESULTS OF RACES ON EAST CAROGA

**FIRST HANDICAP WON BY THE
THE ARROW, WHILE SECOND
EVENT IS TAKEN BY THE ELM-
HURST — SEVERAL OUTINGS
SATURDAY.**

Although there were but three boats entered in the motor races at Caroga Lake Saturday, the events were very interesting and the handicaps were very close. The races were held on East Caroga Lake and a large number of cottagers and those interested in the contests witnessed the events from "Nosnomis Lodge," the boat house adjoining the grounds of M. DeHass Simonson of Brooklyn. The three boats entered in the races were: "Elmhurst," owned by Mr. Simonson; "The Arrow," belonging to H. C. Anthony of Gloversville, and "Maude C," the Johnstown boat owned by John Topp. The time keepers and referees were chosen from the spectators.

The first handicap was won by "The Arrow," with "Elmhurst" a close second and "Maude C" third. The time in this race was especially good and Mr. Anthony's boat was presumably at its best.

In the second and last race, however, "The Arrow" when about half over the three mile course, sprang a leak, causing the engines to stop and practically putting the boat out of the race. Mr. Anthony, by dint of hard labor, however, succeeded in getting the boat to the starting place, coming in last. The race was won by "Elmhurst" with "Maude C" close at its heels.

The races next week will be held on West Caroga Lake and will begin at 2 o'clock. It is expected that at that time all the motor boats on both East and West Caroga Lakes will be entered in the events.

A number of outings were held at the lakes Saturday and the guests were "rooters" at the races. Mr. Anthony entertained the employes of his shops in Gloversville at "Pineholm Grove" on West Lake. The day was spent in various ways and at noon a clam bake was enjoyed. There was everything good to eat and to say the men did justice to the feed would be putting it mildly. After dinner, all hands went over to East

Lake, where they enjoyed the races. Mr. Simonson held a picnic at his spacious grounds on East Lake. "Nosnomis Lodge" was made more attractive with long lines of flags and banners, while "Old Glory" was unfurled in every conceivable place. An elaborate dinner was served and everyone was given a good time. Among the guests were a number from New York, Brooklyn and Long Island, guests of Mr. Simonson and family.

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
